The deadline for submitting an application to the WIA office is August 1, 2021.


Many of you have noticed bright yellow trucks in the neighborhood. LCS is preparing to begin installation. 30 miles of fiber optic cable has arrived and now the digging begins. You will be able to watch the progress as it begins at Highway 190 near the Waterwood billboards in the first steps to bringing fiber optic Internet to your homes. The network engineer is setting up pathways with an integrated payment and management website. Pedestals are arriving next and will be strategically placed throughout the neighborhoods. TXDOT and San Jacinto Commissioners Court have approved LCS to access all TXDOT and county Right of Ways to include private utility easements for the purpose of installing cable and equipment.

Free Installation!!! Don't forget to sign up now and take advantage of the free installation period(no obligation). Once fiber is brought into your neighborhood, there will be a \$149 installation cost per residence. Your WIA vote did not sign you up, follow this link <u>www.lcsfiber.com</u> to sign up now!

Last weekend the Waterwood Volunteer Fire Department firefighters participated in a Landing Zone Training class at the Coldspring Volunteer Fire Department. The class was organized by San Jacinto County First Responders and facilitated by PHI. The topics covered Landing Zone preparation, pilot and flight staff interaction, site safety and patient loading.

We, again, have been provided disaster preparedness supplies by the American Red Cross with a donation of 30 emergency cots. These supplies help bolster our Emergency Preparedness Plan for Waterwood as we enter the Hurricane Season. We have also received additional smoke alarm and emergency supplies from the Red Cross for evacuation planning. Please call to make an appointment for an assessment – 936-755-0950.

The station has accepted one firefighter application; and is currently reviewing another. **We can't stress enough that help is needed as we enter the wildland fire season.** If you have any questions about how you can help your community; members of the fire department will be readily available at the July 4<sup>th</sup> festivities with applications.






Hats off to WWL members, who through their fundraising efforts, have made success for these students an achievable reality.



#### A bird born to run

#### Greater Roadrunners are more interesting than the cartoon

Although many people think of the Warner Bros. cartoon when they hear "roadrunner," the actual bird is much more intriguing than its fictional counterpart. The Greater Roadrunner can outrace a human, kill and eat a rattle-snake and thrive in harsh habitats.

Lucky for us, this fast-running bird of the cuckoo family, once found only in the Desert Southwest, has in recent times extended its range eastward as far as western Louisiana. That means you are likely to see Roadrunners zipping across Waterwood streets and along natural paths and streambeds. They even come into yards to drink from bird feeders and search for a tasty lizard or insect. Several Waterwood residents have seen nesting pairs in the neighborhood. Since they do not migrate, you may see them any time of the year.

Greater Roadrunners are easy to recognize; they are crow-sized but more slender, with long tails, swift legs, speckled plumage, a bushy blue-black crest and a curious attitude. They look nothing like their cuckoo relatives, but their dovelike call sounds like "coo" rather than the "beep beep" of cartoon fame.

As their name indicates, Great Roadrunners are terrestrial birds that prefer to walk or run rather than fly. They can fly when necessary, but are awkward and only fly for short distances. On the ground, however, they are the fastest of any bird that also flies; Roadrunners can run up to 15 miles per hour, with sprints as fast as 26 mph, using their long tails for steering, balancing and braking. Roadrunners have zygodactyl feet, with two toes pointing forward and two toes pointing backward. These feet leave X-shaped footprints that are easy to recognize.


Greater roadrunners are omnivores; they eat both plants and animals. They munch on insects, spiders, snakes, scorpions, centipedes, lizards, birds, eggs, rodents and some carrion, as well as fruit, seeds and other plant material. As a bonus, Roadrunners provide free pest control service — their appetite for insects and rodents is a benefit to humans.

Greater Roadrunners eat poisonous prey, including venomous lizards and scorpions, with no ill effect, but their most amazing eating feat is killing and devouring rattlesnakes. This is often done by a team of two Roadrunners. One bird distracts the snake by jumping and flapping, while the other sneaks up and pins its head, then bashes the snake against a rock. If the snake is too long to swallow at once, a roadrunner might walk around with a length of snake still protruding from its bill, swallowing it a little at a time as the snake digests.

Roadrunners are also called earth-cuckoos, chaparral cocks, snake killers and ground cuckoos. These amazing birds mate for life and renew their vows each spring with courtship dancing, calls and food sharing. The male brings nesting materials, and the female builds a nest, usually in a shrub or tree not far from the ground. Both parents work together to guard and care for their babies, who can run and begin to catch prey when they are three weeks old, but are not fully mature for two to three years.

Although Greater Roadrunners are not on the endangered list, they do face serious threats, including illegal shooting and agricultural pesticides. An even bigger threat is habitat loss since Roadrunners need room to roam and increasing development eliminates prey and nest sites. Household pets, feral animals, pedestrians and traffic can also displace or kill Roadrunners. And, despite the antics of the cartoon roadrunner, coyotes often do catch and eat Roadrunners although Wile E. Coyote never did.

The real Greater Roadrunner, named the state bird of New Mexico in 1949, has long been honored by indigenous and Mexican peoples, who considered the birds to be good luck as well as symbols of strength, courage, speed and endurance. The Roadrunner's distinctive X-shaped footprints are used as sacred symbols by Pueblo tribes to ward off evil. The X shape disguises the direction the bird is heading, and is thought to prevent evil spirits from following. Roadrunners play a role in religious beliefs, folklore and legends of many Native American tribes and are often depicted in paintings and jewelry.

So, if you are lucky enough to see one of our Waterwood Roadrunners cruising around the neighborhood, give it a brake and expect good luck!

#### Fun Fact:

Stylized roadrunner images are frequently used for commercial logos ranging from motorcycles to moving companies, but the most famous faux roadrunner is the one created by Chuck Jones in 1948 for Warner Bros. The bird first debuted with his nemesis, Wile E. Coyote, in 1949, and has appeared in cartoons, comics, commercials and video games as well as the movies *Who Framed Roger Rabbit* and *Space Jam*.
