



The MUD board will meet January 21st. at 3:00 in the WIA building. You are all invited to attend and bring you questions and concerns before us.
















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












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
LCS Fiber Update

Hello Waterwood! We have made some major progress recently and wanted to share where things are at. The network is live and several subscribers are online in a testing capacity! We are tweaking some minor management functions but service has been excellent and online subscribers have provided very positive feedback. We are working hard to get the main Waterwood Parkway line installed permanently and hope to have that done by the next week or so. All 15 major creek crossings and the crossing under US-190 are complete. Barring weather or equipment setbacks, we will begin service connections in Green Tree Village and Whispering Pines 2 by the end of this month.

Some things that will be helpful when we near your area and are ready to connect you up. If you could take a moment to think about these before the installer shows up it will speed up the installation process and improve your experience.

- 1.) Do you have a sprinkler system or other buried private electrical or other lines in your yard that we would need to know about? Knowing what we have to avoid will speed up the installations and avoid unnecessary repairs.
- 2.) Will you be using our WiFi equipment or your own? The Internet service will come into you home directly on a fiber optic connection to an ONU (Optical Network Unit) for the best servie possible. We have selected two types of ONUs depending on your needs. If you want to use your own WiFi router we will provide a single port ONU to feed your router with service. If you want to use our WiFi or desire home phone, we will provide you with the larger ONU that has 4 Ethernet ports, telephone, and Dual Band WiFi built in. When the installer arrives, if you would like assistance setting up your WiFi, please have the SSID name (name you want broadcast when you look at the WiFi access lists) and the WiFi password you intend to use ready for the installer to set up. Examples of easy to remember or identify names and passwords (WiFi SSID: JonesLakehouse, WiFi Password: welove2fish1962). Trying to think of good names and passwords while the installer is waiting usually results in spotty selections. You can always leave the SSID as the default but we will want the default password changed to avoid security issues.
- 3.) Will you need additional work inside your home? Our basic installation brings the optical cable inside your home to a wall-mounted port, typically on an exterior wall. If you need fiber or Ethernet lines run into the attic or other rooms to reach specific locations there may be additional expenses but we are happy to accommodate what you want. If you think you will need some of this additional work, please let the installation scheduler know so we can allot additional time for the onsite work or we may have to return at a later time.
- 4.) There are many modern services that some subscribers are not familiar with. While most users are familiar with streaming video services, if you are not and want a brief overview we can arrange that for you at time of installation or separately if you prefer. If you have your streaming device(s) like Roku, AppleTV, Amazon Fire Stick, or others ready to install we can help you set those up and show you the basics. If you need advanced network help to integrate security camera or other devices that may require static addressing that can be scheduled separately.


We discussed ideas for making more scholarship money and at the January 13th meeting hopefully members will have some fund-raising ideas to share. So get your thinking caps on!!!

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Symbols of freedom or pirates of the bird world?

Majestic Bald Eagles are at home in Waterwood

As the national emblem of our country since 1782 and a spiritual symbol for native peoples for centuries, Bald Eagles may be the most recognizable and admired bird in America, but they have some surprising habits and characteristics. Although chosen to represent freedom and courage, one of our country's founders considered Bald Eagles to be dishonest and cowardly. A bird of paradoxes to be sure.





First of all, Bald Eagles are not bald, as you know if you have been lucky enough to see one up close, which is highly likely since a number of the birds make their home on the shores of Lake Livingston and live here year-round. The only eagles found only in North America, a mature Bald Eagle has a distinctive white feathered head, neck and tail that contrast with a chocolate-brown body, and large yellow bill. In fact, their name stems from the Old English word 'piebald,' which means 'white patch' and refers to their bright white heads.

Covered in dark feathers initially, Bald Eagles don't obtain their distinctive white heads until age 3 or 4. When fully grown, these impressive birds of prey are one of the largest birds in North America, with the females weighing up to 14 pounds and having a wingspan up to 8 feet. Males are smaller, at 7 to 10 pounds with a wingspan of 6 to 7 feet.

After a dramatic courtship, Bald Eagles display strong family values. Bald Eagle courtship involves elaborate calls and flight displays, but the most dramatic behavior is the birds flying high into the sky, locking talons, and free-falling and cartwheeling together, releasing right before they hit the ground. I saw this incredible feat a few years ago in the sky above the fourth fairway on the Waterwood golf course.

Eagle pairs typically bond for life. Each year when breeding season arrives, the same pair meet, build (or reuse) a nest, and raise up to three young. Both eagles help raise the babies, with each sitting on eggs, and hunting and providing food. Bald Eagles make the most massive tree nests ever recorded for any animal species. The largest nest documented was 9.5 feet in diameter, 20 feet deep, and weighed almost 3 tons.



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The average nest, however, is 4 to 5 feet in diameter and 2 to 4 feet deep. Each year, the adult breeding pairs add to the previous year's nest, typically adding about 1-2 feet of new material. Eagle nests usually don't last past five years because they collapse from their immense weight in the tree. Eagles are careful parents; concern for their young is so strong that they walk around the nest by folding their talons in, so they won't accidentally hurt the eaglets.




Bald Eagle nest

As with many animals, the first year is the riskiest for the young eagles, with an estimated 50% death rate. The oldest chick usually has the advantage of a larger size and stronger voice, which draws the parents' attention. This extra attention means they are usually given more food, which can lead to starvation for younger chicks. Other risks come from nest collapses, bad weather or predators such as hawks, crows, owls, bobcats and raccoons. Bald Eagles are mature at 4 to 5 years and ready to find mates. Their average life span in the wild is 20 years, but captive eagles might live twice that long.

Bald Eagles are deadly and efficient hunters, but they often steal their meals. As hunters, eagles dive for prey at speeds between 75-100 miles per hour, and their talons are incredibly strong with a gripping power 10 times greater than a human. They can fly with a fish at least equal to their weight. They have large strong beaks and excellent eyesight, so they can see prey from very high in the sky, utilizing a wide field of vision and the ability to see ultraviolent light. The term 'eagle eye' is an apt description.

Despite these advantages, Bald Eagles can be lazy, often preferring to go after other creatures' catches rather than do their own fishing. A Bald Eagle will harass a hunting Osprey until the smaller raptor drops its prey in midair, where the eagle swoops it up. A Bald Eagle may even snatch a fish directly out of an Osprey's talons. Fishing mammals can also lose prey to Bald Eagle piracy.

In addition to fish, eagles eat birds, reptiles, amphibians, invertebrates such as crabs, and small mammals. They will also scavenge in dumpsters and eat roadkill. When food is available, Bald Eagles may gorge, ingesting a large amount of food and digesting it over several days. They can also survive fasting for many days, even weeks.



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Bald Eagles were near extinction in the 1940s but have made a remarkable recovery.

Unregulated hunting and loss of habitat had taken eagle numbers to a dangerous low when Congress passed the Bald Eagle Protection Act in 1940, making it illegal to kill, sell or possess an eagle. (Only Native Americans are allowed to possess eagle feathers as part of their religious ceremonies.) When DDT was introduced for agricultural use at the end of World War II, Bald Eagles declined further and were placed on the Endangered Species list in 1967. By the early 1970s, there were fewer than 400 breeding pairs in the country. DDT was banned in 1972 and eagles began a recovery. Today, there are an estimated 10,000 pairs.

Once a rare sighting in Texas, Bald Eagles now nest throughout the eastern third of the state., where there are plenty of water sources for hunting fish, and plenty of big trees for perching and nesting. Loss of habitat is the greatest threat to them now as human populations expand.

Here in Waterwood on the shores of a lake filled with fish and surrounded by tall trees, Bald Eagles thrive and thrill bird watchers. Keep an eye out for these flying paradoxes as they soar majestically overhead—or scavenge in a roadside ditch.

Fun Facts: Being the national symbol of the United States means Bald Eagles appear everywhere, from one-dollar bills to countless business logos, making it the most pictured bird in the country, even beating out Northern Cardinals on Christmas cards.

However, one founding father—Benjamin Franklin—disliked the choice of the Bald Eagle, saying, "I wish the Bald Eagle had not been chosen the Representative of our Country. He is a Bird of bad moral Character. He does not get his Living honestly." Franklin was more in favor of a Turkey being the National Bird, saying, "The Turkey is in Comparison a much more respectable Bird, and withal a true original Native of America."

By contrast, Native Americans consider eagles to be sacred since they are the highest-flying birds and are seen to be nearer to the Creator. The eagle symbol signifies courage, wisdom and strength in many Native American cultures.
