
#### **JOB OPENING-NEW WIA OFFICE POSITION**

WIA has waterproof maps of Lake Livingston and surrounding communities for sale in the WIA office for only \$5 per map.




#### **Waterwood Volunteer Fire Department News**

The board members accepted the resignation of Darrell Boeske as he has business that will not allow him to complete his term. We are extremely grateful for Darrell's contributions to our board and the community. In his stead the board approved Jeffery Measamer to fill the unexpired term. We look forward to the experience and knowledge that Jeffery will bring. Waterwood has experienced several interruptions to the water service this past month. The techs from Precision have worked quickly to find and repair all leaks, in some cases working in cold weather and mud for 24 hours at a time. It has been relayed to me that many people have questions and complaints on social platforms. Our field techs can and will answer your questions if asked. The MUD web site has a form where questions can be answered or you may attend our monthly meetings. We have addressed many concerns these past few months in a fair and timely manner.

There are no stupid questions, it seems all I ask are stupid questions, if anyone has concerns the board will address them. You may bring questions and concerns to the January 20th meeting 3:00 in the WIA building.

#### Fiber Optic Installation Year-End Update

#### Hello Waterwood!

I wanted to give everyone a year end update on the fiber optic installation. I'll start by mentioning our 100th customer in Waterwood, John and Sally Charlton of Country Club Estates-1. Many may not know that John was part of WIA's initial exploration into bringing improved Internet services to Waterwood several years ago so it was good to come full circle and get them connected before the end of the year. To date we have installed 170,000 feet of cable and 70,000 feet of conduit in and around Waterwood. We ended the year with 102 connected homes, approximately 1/3 of the total interested homes in Waterwood. Our overall online percentage time was 99.8% after a 13 hour outage in May caused by a damaged main line in Conroe with our service provider. Our local Waterwood equipment had a 100% uptime percentage since we went live January 1, 2022.


January construction will see Country Club Estates-3(LaJolla) main construction completed, construction to Fairway-1, and starting the Bay Hill and St Andrews area. As we transition from focusing on main line construction to customer connections, I am setting some loose goals of 5 customers connected per week by February and 8 per week by April. There were 8 customers connected this week, 7 new connections and 1 reconnect for a sold home. Our main line through Waterwood is completed and our branch lines are in various stages of completion.

The initial target for project completion was June 2023. There have been a lot of obstacles in the pandemic/supply-chain disruption/labor shortage era of the last 2 years but we have kept moving forward and expect to have the main construction done and the majority of the interested customers connected by that initial target date.

Quality of service is my number one goal and I truly appreciate the positive feedback from those posting their experiences during and after our installation.

#### Keith's Corner: WIA Maintenance/WNGRA Liaison

Happy New Year to everyone.

This column is intended to help those of us with a 'tree situation.' This means any situation where a neighbor's tree is in a condition where it poses a threat to you or your property.

Our forest out here is beautiful, but it has experienced a lot of stress over the years. So there are trees nearly everywhere that have problems. Dead trees, sick trees, leaning trees, rotting trees. Any of these in the wrong location can pose a danger to your property.

So, what do you do when this happens?


Here are the steps you should take when you have a 'tree situation:'

- 1. Find out who owns the property with the 'bad tree.'
- 2. This is done by calling WIA (936-891-7710). Lisa or Kathy can usually give you this information.
  - A. Give them the address of the property in question; this can save lots of time
  - B. WIA can usually give you the contact information for the property owner.
- 3. Take pictures of the tree. Try to show the danger clearly, taking multiple angles if necessary.
- 4. Call your own insurance company and inform them. Send them the pics, just in case.
- 5. Contact the property owner.
  - a. Describe the situation in common sense, reasonable terms.
  - b. Be factual and not accusatory, not emotional.
  - c. Send the pictures so that they see the reason for the problem.
  - d. In polite language, definitively ask the property owner to take care of the issue.
    - i. Asking is important. If you don't ask, they may not ever volunteer to fix it.
  - e. Give the property owner your best guess as to the time frame needed for action.

What do you do if the property owner does not take care of this? Please contact WIA. You will not like the answers we can give. WIA does have options, but we are legally limited in what we can do on private property. To make matters more difficult, we can only do certain things on private property after several legal hurdles have been crossed. This takes money and time. Your effort is usually better spent on convincing the property owner than to simply 'turn it over to WIA.' In summary, we can help; we're here to help, but we would all be better if the neighbor takes care of their business.

If the property causing you a problem is owned by WIA, as are a few of the properties in Waterwood, we will know this when you call to ask who the owner is. For WIA properties, the answer is easy for you. It is our responsibility as the property owner, and we will take care of it. We will of course try to be thrifty with the work, so we may try to get 'your' work done in combination with other tree work in the area. This might take longer than you would want, but be patient. We will get it done in good time. The last tree work done for a 'WIA tree' endangering property was taken care of on 12/29, approximately 10 days after we were made aware of the concern.


Also, don't forget to decorate your golf carts in your best Mardi Gras/Cajun themed designs. Judging for the bestdressed golf cart will be awarded.




**Stop the Bleed-** Free to the public. Max class size is 20 individuals.

#### GENERAL INFORMATION

THE DEVELOPER

WATERWOOD Resort is a private facility owned by the Horizon Properties Corporation of Tucson, Arizona. All of the facilities are private and may be used only by golf club members, hotel guests, social members and their guests. If you are not a member, you may arrange to visit WATERWOOD by calling the Information Center.


COUNTRY CLUB

WATERWOOD NATIONAL COUNTRY CLUB is a dramatically designed structure with just over 40,000 square feet (approximately one acre) which is the focal point of the multi-million dollar complex. The upper level of the Clubhouse is characterized by vaulted ceilings and walls constructed of "clearheart" redwood. A large vaulted skylight, stained glass partitions, rich tapestries and original watercolors enhance this upper level, which includes reception, lobby, the Garden Room (dining room), the Garden Terrace, the Garden Court (lounge), dance floor and meeting rooms. The club's lower level is comprised of Waterwood's Pro Shop, the Scorecard (snack bar), men's and women's locker rooms, saunas, meeting rooms and golf cart facilities. The view from the upper level of the Country Club overlooks the ninth green and the tenth tees of Waterwood National Golf Course. Waterwood has hotel rooms available at the luxurious Cabanas and Lodge units.

GOLF COURSE

WATERWOOD NATIONAL GOLF COURSE was designed by Pete Dye and Associates, in the best Scottish Links tradition. Classical design concepts are combined here with the rugged natural beauty of deep East Texas to provide a course that is unique both in its presentation and challenge. All efforts have been made to emphasize the traditional values and the fair but imaginative shotmaking that so inspired the game of golf and became the foundation for the great "old" courses of the world. Although the course is relatively young, it ranked as the fourth best course in the state of Texas according to a 1980 survey of the Dallas Times Herald. Major tournaments held at Waterwood include: The PGA Tour Card Qualifying Tournament, three years; the British Caledonia Transatlantic Cup Tournament; the PGA Texas Southern Sectional, and, in July 1982, the Women's Western Amateur Tournament.

The course also hosted numerous college tournaments, including the 1982 NAIA.

MARINA

The wide service marina, includes fishing gear rentals, bait, gas, boats, stalls (both covered and open), fishing guides, as well as groceries, picnic tables and barbecue pits.

POOLS CREEK PARK A wooded 2.5-acre "island" contains a swimming pool with a water slide, picnic tables, barbecue pits and two ponds for canoeing or fishing for children. A boat dock is found behind the Smokehouse with access from Lake Livingston and the Marina, and a merry-go-round, several swing sets and other playground equipment is available for younger children.

RECREATION

WATERWOOD has four lighted tennis courts located adjacent to the Country Club, featuring Chevron Laykold all-weather surfaces.

There are three pools to choose from - one for swimming, one for diving and one for children. The swimming pool is Junior Olympic in size. The children's wading pool is shallow and fenced in with ample room for parents to sun while watching the young ones.
