



Keith's Corner: Waterwood Maintenance for March '23

Welcome to the March version of our newsletter. Men, did you step up for your Special Lady on Valentines' Day? Well, if not, you have all year to recover; take it slow and the wounds will heal. If you did well by your Lady, please do not brag too much, OK?

Before we get started, please remember that I have asked everyone to inform Lisa at wia@waterwoodwia.com whenever you see a maintenance issue around here. I have spent several hours logging down everything that has come to my attention so far on a document called the Maintenance Master List. Keep the observations coming, folks, and thank you.

As the winter passes, we need to talk about a problem we've had the last couple of winters. This will inform all of you how we need to handle the problem.

OK, during the fall and winter we have tons of leaves fall like a nice brown carpet, all over the area. This area also includes the streets and curbs. We've been receiving reports from several subdivisions that our landscape contractor hasn't been cleaning out leaf build-up from around the curb drains and at flush grating drains. When leaves build up at these areas, drainage suffers and local flooding can occur.

This winter we started a program to pay special attention to leaves on the streets. It is my belief that we have made much progress on this problem. We still are not 100%, but we are in constant communication with our provider, Timberlake Nursery, and they are doing a better job on this.

The main way that Timberlake gets rid of leaves along the streets is to simply use a leaf blower and blow the leaves 'sideways' from the street out to the adjoining easement outside of the curb. The reason we blow instead of bag the leaves is that bagging would cost all of us extra money: it takes much more labor to bag than to blow. Especially when you realize that not only would we have to bag the leaves, we have to transport them and dispose of them.


The goal is to blow the leaves as far away from the curbs as we can. Where we are blowing next to vacant lots or forest, we ask Timberlake to blow 5 to 10 feet away from the curb minimum, and where practical blow the leaves all the way back to the tree line. We also tell Timberlake that just blowing near the drains is not good enough, they need to clear out a good distance away from the drain.

In addition to this, when we receive a complaint about a local flooding problem caused by leaves, we talk to Timberlake and arrange a special look at the particular location. This has happened at least 3 times in the last 3 months and we will continue this. If you see a problem let us know.

Here is where the problem comes in. When we implemented this plan a couple of months ago, Timber-lake blew the leaves sideways just like we told them to. As they passed by vacant lots, there was no problem. Then they passed by a lot that was occupied by an owner who took pride in the way he / she kept their yard. All of a sudden, there were piles of leaves blown up into this beautiful yard! The owner had an understandable reaction: they were not happy with either Timberlake or WIA.

What can be done about this problem? We have considered the issue, and I think there is no way we can arbitrarily pass by anyone's yard and blow leaves up into it. While many might allow us to do so, at least that many - or more - are likely to get upset to one degree or another.

So, we will adopt a policy of NOT blowing leaves up into landowners' yards if they appear to be maintained to any extent.

What is the consequence of all this? If you own a property that is reasonably well-kept, which is basically everyone in Waterwood, both sides of 980 included, the street in front of your property may NOT have the leaves blown as well as you might like. There is Good News and Bad News resulting from this:

GOOD NEWS: This will keep you from having to do extra work on your yard. We won't ruin a weekend's work on your 'lush green carpet' by blowing dead leaves onto it.

BAD NEWS: There could be more leaves in the street than you would care for.

BAD NEWS: If your street has a difficult drainage problem caused by leaves at / in the drains, your pretty yard (with the leaves in the street) may be contributing to our ponding / flooding issues. You may need to deal with this fact at some point.

GOOD NEWS: You have the opportunity to show your neighbors you care about the overall health of Waterwood by **taking care of the leaves in the street in front of your property** all by yourself. Congratulations, you are a Contributor. Thank you!

This policy shows respect for the resident by not harming his / her lawn appearance. All of you need to know that respect goes both ways: Are there residents out there who obtain their clean yard by blowing their leaves out into the street and 'waiting for Waterwood' to take care of it? This is particularly tacky. It gives you a temporary free ride at the expense of all your neighbors, and also contributes directly to potential flooding on your own street. We urge you to take care of your leaves, yard leaves AND street leaves included.



Thank you to David Ellis, Nancy Measamer, Pat Zappa, and Carole Magee for manning our booth.



Most importantly a great big thank you to all who gave support to our Fire Department and Auxiliary. It was a good beginning to our first year as an Auxiliary Service!



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

Young Waterwood Resident Authors 1st Book!

Quinn Westbrook and her family have been Waterwood residents for almost 3 years. The family relocated from the Houston area in the middle of COVID for quiet time and reflection and have never looked back on leaving the city life. While school is a little different as she and her brother both attend online, her natural drive for learning has not changed! Quinn has been writing books since she could hold a pencil. Her love of the arts started early in life as her mother, Doireann Greene, who has a background in education and teaching, gave her every opportunity available to grow mentally and physically.



"Quinn was reading and writing well before she started Kindergarten," her mother says. "She's always had a natural drive to learn new things and I realized I wanted her to reach all her goals no matter her age."

The Adventures of Color Splat Blue is only one of the several stories Quinn has written over the years. Every year when school is finally out and summer begins, Quinn sits to think of new subjects to write about by mapping ideas from her own adventures such as equestrian lessons at Camp Cullen in Trinity, Sheriff's Deputy training in Groveton, or some funny anecdote she created on her own. Her mom would help her print copies, laminate, and bind the stories to go out in the mail to family members who could not wait to see what she had come up with.

Publishing Quinn's first book faced many challenges. Finding a publisher, illustrator, and being able to trust someone while making sure it is a success can be stressful. There were many days and nights that Quinn sat and edited her writing to make sure the words were exactly as she meant them to be. The arduous work finally paid off in January of 2023 as her first book to be published, The Adventures of Color

Splat Blue, went live on Amazon for preorder on the Kindle app, with hardcover and paperback options on the horizon.

When asked how she felt about her new success and finally being done with her first book, Quinn says "It was exciting and I'm ready to publish the next one!"


The costs associated with publishing books can be expensive, so to offset fees, Quinn has a few groups on Facebook, 'Quinn Westbrook – Aspiring Author' and 'Quinn's Lemons' that she uses to fundraise. While Quinn earns a small bit of money from doing chores and from an allowance, she is still determined to earn the money on her own.
