


Whew!!!! We have a ton going on and coming up. Hope this helps. More info to come. As always, thank you for your participation and continued generosity!



Who, who, who's there?

Owls rule the night in Waterwood's forests

You may not see them, but they are here year-round, nesting and raising young, silently hunting by night and sleeping in dense evergreens during the day. Although at least four owl species are native to East Texas, you are more likely to hear these secretive birds' calls than catch a glimpse of them.

Adding to the mystery of their nighttime adventures, owls have a special type of feather that deadens sound so you cannot hear them fly. Coupled with keen night vision and superior hearing, owls are able to sneak up on their prey in the dark. Owls vary in colors and size, but none migrate, and they are all monogamous, with both parents caring for the young.

Owls are excellent hunters, eating a wide variety of invertebrates like insects and spiders as well as vertebrates such as small mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians and fish. They swallow their prey whole, then a couple of times a day, they cough up pellets containing the matter that doesn't pass through their digestive tracts. Scientists study the content of these pellets to learn more about owl's ecosystems.

Here's a brief look at the four kinds of owls you might hear in the night, or see, if you are lucky.

Great Horned Owl

However, they are very powerful and can prey on animals larger than themselves, including cats, skunks and opossums. If you hear an agitated group of cawing American Crows, they may be mobbing a Great Horned Owl. The crows have good reason, because the Great Horned Owl is their most dangerous predator.

This is the owl of storybooks, with a deep hooting voice and an intimidating yellow-eyed stare. The Great Horned Owl is impressive in size: With a body up to 2 feet in length and a wingspan as wide as 5 feet, this is the biggest of our native owls and also the most widespread owl in North America. Varying in color from brown to grey or black and white, the Great Horned Owl has distinctive large yellow-orange eyes and ear tufts that appear to be horns.

Barred Owl


This medium-sized owl is the most common owl in East Texas and is slightly bigger than a crow. The Barred Owl is a gray-brown color, streaked with white horizontal bars on its chest, vertical bars on its belly and a long barred tail. They have dark eyes, a yellow bill and no ear tufts.

They weigh about half as much as the Great Horned Owl, which is their most serious predatory threat.

You can recognize the Barred Owl's song by listening for 8 or more drawn-out notes, "Who cooks for you; who cooks for you all?" They will readily call back to imitations of its call. This is an ancient species; Pleistocene fossils of Barred Owls, at least 11,000 years old, have been dug up in Florida, Tennessee and Ontario.

Eastern Screech Owl

This is the smallest owl in Texas, weighing less than 6 ounces, with a wingspan of up to 2 feet. They have small ear tufts, which they flatten at will, and bright yellow eyes with a pale bill. Although the Great Horned and Barred Owls may sometimes be seen during the day, the Screech Owl is exclusively nocturnal. They are known to eat a variety of songbirds, including the European Starling.



Screech-owls are "neighborhood owls." If you put an owl box in your yard, the screech-owl will probably come nest in it. To imagine the Screech Owl's call, think of a horse on helium: The little raptor lets out a descending whinny, capped off

Barn Owl

Although native to our area, the Barn Owl is much less common than the other three species. They are slightly smaller than the Barred Owl, but sport a distinctive heart -shaped facial disk. Barn Owls have white to cinnamon underparts with spots and golden tawny upperparts. They also have longer legs and a barred tail.

Though the Barn Owl may look elegant, its voice is anything but; they emit eerie, raspy calls, quite unlike the hoots of other owls. Their song has been described as an unexpected gasping screech that can raise the hair on the back of your neck!

As their name implies, Barn Owls like to occupy buildings near areas cleared for agriculture. Unfortunately, Barn Owls are declining in parts of their range due to habitat loss. threatened by the conversion of agricultural land to urban and suburban development, and the loss of suitable nesting sites such as large, hollow trees and old buildings. Also, because Barn Owls hunt by flying low over fields, they are often hit by cars.

Why encourage owls?

Owls are not common backyard birds, but they can provide intriguing nighttime sounds and excellent rodent control. Because owls are not highly active during the day, a backyard owl can coexist with other backyard birds, and as excellent hunters, they can help control squirrel and rodent populations.

Owls are protected by state and federal laws, but their populations are in decline due to habitat loss and to being poisoned by pesticides and other toxic substances that accumulate in their prey. All of our native owls can be attracted to nest boxes; plans and directions for placement can be found online. Give a hoot!

Fun (but not) Factual: Craig Hensley, a biologist with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Texas Nature Trackers, mentions in an interview people believe a lot of myths about owls: "One of the things I heard as a young naturalist was that if you hear an owl call three nights in a row, someone you know is going to die. So, if I hear them call two nights in a row, I don't try to listen for a third."
