
FIREWORKS

Annual HOA Dues Collections


Annual HOA dues collections have continued. WIA office staff and Collections Committee members have sent out over 250 formal Texas Property Code 209 letters to delinquent HOA dues property owners. Through this process we are approaching 1,000 collections which is a significant increase in collections over prior years. In addition WIA has accepted over 50 properties from owners in lieu of receiving past dues and has sold more than 20 of these properties to hopefully dues paying owners. WIA has also turned over more than 100 delinquent property owners to our HOA attorney for collection. Once an account has been turned over to our attorney, additional legal fees must be paid for by the delinquent property owner. Depending on whether the attorney has to file suit against the property owner, legal fees can range from \$150 to \$1,500.

The WIA office staff and Collections Committee still have much work to undertake. However, if annual HOA dues are not paid timely by December 31, interest at 10% per annum will be charged to the property owners' account and collection procedures will start immediately. It is not fair to the property owners that pay on-time while others pay late and require significant staff time and costs to collect. HOA fees are similar to property taxes; regardless of whether you receive an HOA fees invoice, the property owner is still obligated to pay their fees on-time.

If you still have not paid your annual HOA fees for 2021 or prior, be aware that the WIA office staff and Collections Committee will pursue collection. And remember, if your account is turned over to the WIA HOA attorney for collection, significant legal fees will be added to your account.

Household Trash

One of the services paid for with your annual HOA fees is household garbage drop-off. These services cost each paying property owner approximately \$24 per year. This is a significant savings compared to curbside trash pickup costing approximately \$400 to \$500 per year depending upon the provider. Garbage stickers (2 per household) are available at the WIA office and must be applied by the WIA office staff to your vehicle. The dumpsters are located in Whispering Pines II on Cheyenne.


In order to assist in keeping costs down it is requested that your garbage is limited to household trash only. Please break down large boxes prior to putting them into the dumpsters. Non-broken down boxes take up a great amount of space in the limited dumpsters we have available. Also, there is a sign on the entrance gate that lists items that should not be placed in the dumpsters. Many of the forbidden items can be collected as heavy trash on the first Monday of the month by the maintenance staff. Collection of heavy trash must be requested by no later than the Friday prior to the first Monday of the month. Requests can be made by phone, email or in person to the WIA office.






Waterwood MUD District will be ending services with Inframark at a time to be determined. I want thank Inframark for their service to the District.



WNGRA Golf Tournament



We have been seeing more ATV and UTV's being used recently for both golfing and/or riding.


These types of vehicles are prohibited from being on the course and the cart paths.


We want everyone to be able to enjoy the beauty of the course, but we need to follow the rules that are in place.




Virginia Boyce: Thank you all so much for helping me with my college dreams! I so deeply appreciate it.

Texas has its own Bird of Paradise

Scissor-tailed Flycatchers spend spring and summer in Waterwood



As you walk, bike or drive around Waterwood, keep an eye out for a slim, light grey bird with a split tail as long as its body and peachy-orange wing and belly markings. If you are lucky, you could witness a Scissor-tailed Flycatcher executing a tight spinning maneuver to catch an insect in mid-air.

This exotic bird, also known as Texas Bird of Paradise, is a member of the kingbird species, but is the only kingbird in the United States with the distinctive scissor-like tail, which facilitates their amazing aerial acrobatics. Flycatchers migrate into our area to spend spring and summer, when they mate and raise their young. They can be seen everywhere, on telephone wires or fences, up in high trees, in open areas such as pastures or golf courses, or flying near the water to catch lake insects.



As indicated by their name, Scissor-tails are primarily insectivores, feeding mostly on flies of course, but also grasshoppers, crickets and other insects harmful to crops and animals, as well as beetles, wasps, caterpillars and spiders. After snaring a large insect, the Flycatcher carries it to a fence or tree branch and beats it against the perch to be sure it is dead and 'safe' to eat. You won't see a Scissor-tail at your backyard feeder, but they do occasionally visit mulberry or hackberry bushes for a fruit treat.

After wintering in Mexico and Central America, male Scissor-tailed Flycatchers arrive in our area by early April to establish and defend their territories. When the females begin to arrive, the males perform 'sky dances', fluttering vertically up and down as much as 100 feet and doing backwards somersaults. They frequently open and close their tails, which look like a pair of scissors, to attract females.


Scissor-tailed Flycatchers form monogamous couples and produce one or two broods per year. They are highly territorial; both males and females will fearlessly chase other birds out of their territories, accompanied by loud, squeaky, bubbling calls. Trespassing happens frequently, especially in the early morning, so keep an eye out if you see these birds as you may be treated to a remarkable aerial chase.



Scissor-tailed Flycatchers nest in trees, shrubs or brush that offers protection, but also make themselves at home in urban landscaped areas and even place nests in sites such as towers or bridge supports. The female builds the nest, using many human products such as string, cloth, paper, carpet fuzz and even cigarette filters, as well as chicken feathers, grass and thistledown. Both parents bring food to the nestlings, which fledge in about two weeks.

By summer's end, the Flycatchers begin to gather in large, loud flocks and by October they start a wandering trip southward. By the way, a group of scissor-tailed flycatchers is called a 'zipper,' 'snip' or 'pinking,' but no one seems to know the reason why these terms were chosen.

Although Scissor-tailed Flycatchers are not designated an endangered species, their numbers have declined by about 30% since the 1960s. However, unlike many other birds, deforestation is beneficial for Flycatchers because they prefer open areas. The greatest threats to newly hatched birds are climate changes, severe storms and tornados, as well as natural enemies such as hawks, grackles, mockingbirds, crows and blue jays. Like all other bird species, climate change is certainly affecting Flycatchers' range. In November of 2021, bird watchers flocked to the Dorval Technoparc in Montreal hoping to catch a glimpse of a juvenile Scissor-tailed Flycatcher that had somehow made its way there.


But here in East Texas, we are lucky that our Texas Bird of Paradise is a common sight. Keep an eye out and you may be rewarded with a memorable aerial show!

Fun Facts: These birds tend to defend their breeding territories aggressively, often chasing away much larger birds. A kingbird was photographed in 2009 defending its young by landing on and sinking its talons into the back of a red-tailed hawk and pecking its skull until the red-tailed hawk gave up and flew away.


